



Roy started working in the fishery and admits he was useless. The only thing he could do any good aboard a dory was row or haul trawl. His father said if he had to fish for a living he would starve. So Roy went to work in the lumber woods. Didn't like it. Was cook on a schooner. Work was hard, money was scarce. But then one day Roy got an offer of a job as a deckhand on the *Southern Wind*, a local schooner that brought coal from North Sydney to Newfoundland in the fall and salt fish from Newfoundland to Portugal in the summer, and things began looking a lot brighter. Life was good, but as with any life it wasn't all roses and sunshine.

The fifth book in the Sebastian Synard mystery series takes our intrepid tour guide/private detective on a jaunt across Newfoundland and into Labrador, in pursuit of those towers of intrigue—lighthouses! The final stop on Synard's lighthouse tour is the one at L'Anse Amour, Labrador, the highest in all Atlantic Canada. It's a long climb into the lantern room, and a long fall from its catwalk to the ground below. Dead is photographer Amanda Thomson. Who is the scoundrel that nudged her past the railing? The RCMP in Forteau are pointing to one of the tour groups, but Sebastian and his partner Mae have other ideas. They retrace the excursions of Amanda and her vagabond boyfriend back to a section of northern Newfoundland called the French Shore. 


Mudflowers

Both are from Newfoundland but move easily in this world of crowded patios and DIY movie shoots. When Sophie meets the glamorous poet Maggie, who is the downtown product of a hundred cool queer bars, she falls into a bewildered infatuation, but secrets emerge that threaten to crumble the foundation of her relationship with Alex and Maggie both.



Elsewhere in Beckford, the all-female town council is concerned about surviving another winter in their community. 


All Things Broken



Separated from family and friends, Sivino and his companions find themselves on a perilous path that leads them ever further from those they love. With the assistance of Lomin, the mysterious village recluse, and Niamh, a faerae whose history is inextricable intertwined with the Realms and its inhabitants, they will deal with conflicts for which they are unprepared, in a land both unfamiliar and treacherous. The hardest part of piecing together that which is broken, Sivino will realize, is that he'll have to start with himself.

Their story is a gripping portrayal of battles fought, of valour, of camaraderie, of everyday men putting their lives on the line for the freedom of others. And you will meet Mary Farrell, a passionate young woman, who is driven to go beyond the good works of the Woman's Patriotic Association supporting the men on the front. Mary joins the Voluntary Aid Detachment and is posted to a military hospital in France where she is tested to the limit while doing her best to care for the injured and dying.

Dwain Campbell Engen Books, 2023






The Cottage Across the Lake






Na Lanni (Kidnapped children of Culdina)

A strange fog suddenly descends over the barrens stranding her overnight by the side of Aidan's Pond. In the night, footfalls squelching through rain-soaked moss frighten Allison and when she stands to identify the source, a bad fall renders her unconscious. She awakes in a strange world called Shoshanna, surrounded by impossible beings, and is asked to embark on a perilous trek to rescue five kidnapped children... faerie children. Na Lanni (our children) are captives in the dungeons of the heartless Tragen Dowhan. Allison must use every ounce of strength and courage she possesses to survive. Along the way, she experiences failure and triumph, heartache and joy, betrayal, and love. She also witnesses wonders no one at home would believe. The dangerous journey turns her world upside down, forcing her to reevaluate everything she thought she knew about Newfoundland faeries, her own family, and herself. Six Seandra Dowhan (faeries) and one human leave Culdina on a mission. Not all return.



As Loved Our Fathers

Jona is obsessed with his work. An archaeologist and cultural anthropologist originally from Niger, he spends his days lecturing at Cambridge University and dreaming about his youth in the field — a time when the world seemed wide open and new, and every stone could hide a new clue or artefact to be unearthed. That was long ago, now, and he has since regulated himself to the position of 'armchair anthropologist.' But all that changes when a new teacher's assistant uncovers information that points to an ancient artefact of massive importance — the Holy Grail — being kept in a secret location on the island of Newfoundland. Now he must team up with Lar Reynolds, a Professor of Newfoundland History working at Memorial University, on a quest to end one of humanity's longest mysteries, all while avoiding the questions of an investigative reporter named Juliana Minh who seeks to ruin Jona's reputation before he can reclaim it.



Les Innocents

A brother and sister are orphaned in an isolated cove on Newfoundland's northern coastline. Their home is a stretch of rocky shore governed by the feral ocean, by a relentless pendulum of abundance and murderous scarcity. Still children with only the barest notion of the outside world, they have nothing but the family's boat and the little knowledge passed on haphazardly by their mother and father to keep them. As they fight for their own survival through years of meagre catches and storms and ravaging illness, it is their fierce loyalty to each other that motivates and sustains them. But as seasons pass and they wade deeper into the mystery of their own natures, even that loyalty will be tested. This novel is richly imagined and compulsively readable, a riveting story of hardship and survival, and an unflinching exploration of the bond between brother and sister. By turns electrifying and heartbreaking, it is a testament to the bounty and barbarity of the world, to the wonders and strangeness of our individual selves.





Nobody ever said being a trans superhero would be easy.

Reeling from his mentor's murder and accused of complicity with the man who killed him, Toby MacNamara, AKA Double Tap, is quick to lash out at any target that presents itself. His attitude immediately sets him butting heads with reserve squad leader Alex Corbett (Justice), whose visual impairment doesn't stop him from seeing right away how much trouble his new squad member is going to be. Alex struggles to keep his unruly team on track, and away from each other's throats, as what should have been a simple mission against minor villain Doctor Defenestrator blossoms into an unexpectedly vicious trap. Now with his promising career in the Metahuman Defence Corps forced to a standstill and a team of misfits as his only allies, Toby must find the courage to trust these virtual strangers with his life. And, just maybe, with the woman he's still learning how to be. She knew it wouldn't be easy, but nobody told her it would be quite this hard.



Now, a group of horror-loving kids break into the abandoned Marsters' house to get to the bottom of what really happened that Halloween. Expanding on the world he created for his award-winning short film **That Halloween**, Mike Hickey (**Terror Nova**) brings forward the rich history of the town of Granville and the Willow Woods that surround it.



The River Murder

Harbour Grace , Newfoundland , June 1884 . Sergeant Sean Ryan, an officer with the Terra Nova Constabulary, is transferred from St. John's to police the very troubled and tense Catholic community of Riverhead, Harbour Grace, a place he thought he had left behind him. Just five months ago, the now-infamous religious riot known as the Harbour Grace Affray saw five men tragically killed—a lone Catholic, Patrick Callahan, and four Protestants. Only a week into his new posting, Sean is thrust into action. Shockingly, Thomas Callahan, son of the popular Catholic man who had died in the Affray, is found shot and left for dead in the raging Bannerman River. The young policeman then discovers that Leah Thomey, his exlover, is still living in Riverhead, having given up her dream of a professional life in the Boston States. Sergeant Ryan is troubled to learn that Leah had become romantically involved with the deceased Thomas Callahan. The young Catholic cop is challenged to find out who killed Thomas Callahan, the only son of Patrick Callahan, while he faces resistance from an untrusting public—including members of his own family.


Ananias



William Ping's millennial life revolves around eating at restaurants, posting online about eating at restaurants, then overanalyzing it. This changes unexpectedly when a dinner with his Chinese girlfriend's family goes sideways and his insecurity about his biracial identity and his ignorance of his own Chinese heritage overflow like lava. During a much-needed break from the dinner table, Will is visited in the men's room by a sarcastic, bullying spirit named Mo. The spirit whisks him into the past to learn about the life of his grandfather, the first William Ping, who emigrated from China to Newfoundland in 1931 to work in a laundry. Based on a true story, **Hollow Bamboo** recounts with humour and sympathy the often-brutal struggles, and occasional successes, faced by some of the first Chinese immigrants in Newfoundland. It is a journey of heartbreak, sacrifice, brotherhood and family ties. But most of all, it is about love and survival on the Rock. Drawing on elements of magical realism, autofiction and satire, as well as deep historical research, **Hollow Bamboo** is a fresh and original portrayal of our past and our present, and the debut of an extraordinary new author.




Sullewey: the sequel to My Indian

Suliewey: The Sequel to My Indian continues the story of Mi'kmaw guide Sylvester Joe, whose traditional name is Suliewey, as he seeks out the last remaining Beothuk community. In **My Indian**, Sylvester was hired by William Cormack in 1822 to guide him across Newfoundland in search of Beothuk encampments. In fact, he followed the advice of his Elders and guided Cormack away from the Beothuk. In this sequel, having parted ways with Cormack at St. George's Bay, Sylvester decides to go out on his own, in search of the winter camp of the last of the remaining Beothuk.

Written as fiction by two Mi'kmaw authors, **Suliewey** supports Mi'kmaw oral history of friendly relationships with the Beothuk. The novel reclaims the settler narrative that the Beothuk and the Mi'kmaq of Newfoundland were enemies and represents an existing kinship between the Mi'kmaq and the Beothuk. Rich in oral history, the descriptions of traditional ceremonies and sacred medicines, the use of Mi'kmaw language, and the teachings of two-spirit place readers on the land and embed them in the strong relationships described throughout the book.




Going For The Gullies




Homesick for Nowhere: essays inspired by travel and other nuisances



Love and War: the true story of William and Edith Lundrigan

The moving story of a World War II veteran from Upper Island Cove, Newfoundland, and his war bride from Essex, England. William Lundrigan of Upper Island Cove joined the British Royal Navy on January 8, 1940. For over 2,100 days he served in active theatres of war, including the Battle of the Atlantic, as well as in Russia, France (including Normandy Beach on D-Day), Italy, Malta, Belgium, the Netherlands, and North Africa. Edith, from South Stifford in Essex, England, grew up in a working-class family and enjoyed a good life. She began working in an essential food factory in 1939, at age sixteen, where she was required to stay for the next six years. While anxiously awaiting news from her brother who was a POW of the Japanese working on the Death Railway, she spent much time with her co-workers or her parents in an air-raid shelter as a result of the Blitz carried out by the Nazi Luftwaffe. Edith and William met in October 1944 and quickly fell in love. After a brief romance, they married in 1945 and lived in England until 1949. They then sailed on the RMS Newfoundland to start a new life in Canada's newest province. This book explores the impact of war, on their lives and mutual love, for the next sixty-one years. They raised a family and navigated living in the backdrop of financial hardship as well as the haunting tentacles of a long -ago and faraway war. Under these difficult circumstances, their spirits were tested but their heads remained unbowed.




The Luckiest Thirteen: a true story of a battle for survival in the North Atlantic

Nation Builders and Enemy Aliens: four centuries of German experience in Canada

Today German Canadians are among Canada's most assimilated citizens, often distinguishable from other Canadians by their name only. Not too long ago, however, they were also associated with Canada's enemy in two world wars, discriminated against, and subjected to infringements of their citizenship rights. Virtually overnight, Canadians of German-speaking background were recast into disloyal enemy aliens. Anti-German sentiments and stigmas, unknown in Canada before World War I, became firmly entrenched and have obliterated their legacy as nation builders. This book documents and illustrates how German Canadians have experienced Canada and how Canada has experienced German Canadians over the course of four centuries. It shows what influence Canada's relations with Germany had on this development. This is the first comprehensive synopsis of the German experience in Canada.




A Queer History of Newfoundland

Rhea Rollmann Engen Books, 2023

Through decades of repression – both intentional and unintentional – the powerful story of 20th century queer community-building and activism in this province has remained largely ignored. Until now. Journalist Rhea Rollmann, through extensive interviews, archival work and investigative reporting, brings that history to light in **A Queer History of Newfoundland**.


Organized queer activism dates back to at least 1974 in this province, but queer presence and community stretches back much farther. Rollmann spent years scouring archives, newspapers and court records to chronicle that history. She draws on archival work as well as more than 120 first-hand interviews with activists and community members to document this history behind the history of the province. The book focuses on the fight for human rights protections, AIDS activism, the growth of the city's vibrant queer bar scene, lesbian struggles for space in the feminist movement, trans struggles for recognition and health care, and more. Just as same-sex intimacy emerged in spaces as varied as the fishing industry and campus dorms, queer liberation also took diverse forms in this province, from quiet living-room consciousness-raising groups to angry, in-your-face marches on homophobic bars. Newfoundland and Labrador has been tied into national and international queer liberation networks ever since the 1970s, but NL'ers also played a major role in shaping those national movements. This book explores all of these stories, and more. The story of the queer rights movement in this province is one of great pride and joy; one of hardship and struggle; and ultimately, one of triumph. Why? Because: There have always been – and always will be – queers in Newfoundland and Labrador.



Seventh Son: my road to success, a memoir

Jim Scott Flanker Press, 2023

This book is about the life of Jim Scott, from his birth in 1962 through to 2022, a journey that took him from a blue-collar family to becoming a successful businessman and self-made millionaire. His journey starts like that of any normal kid in a Canadian middle-class family living in a one-industry town. However, tragedy struck with the loss of his father in 1977. Jim left school less than a year later, and at sixteen years of age, with only a grade eight education, he ventured off to trades school in Gander. He tried a course in autobody mechanics but found it wasn't for him. Next he tried his hand at learning the millwright trade at a different trades school. His search for employment landed him several jobs throughout Canada and the USA, until at the age of forty-four he created his own firm, Standard Consulting Inc. In nine years, this project and construction management firm grew to a multi-million dollar operation via work from mines with the Iron Ore Company of Canada (IOC), Wabush, and Vale. At the age of fifty-three, Jim Scott sold his company to a national engineering firm and remained as one of its very few non-engineering partners and owners. He managed a multitude of clients in Energy and Industry, two large sectors in Atlantic Canada, including Newfoundland Hydro, Newfoundland Power, New Brunswick Power, Nova Scotia Power, Maritime Electric (PEI), Saint John Energy, Wabush Mines, IOC Mine, CFI Mine, and Vale Mine. Jim Scott retired in 2021 at the age of fifty-nine, only to begin a new venture, namely starting a new firm, Scott Consulting Inc., which now provides business development throughout Newfoundland and Labrador for two large Canadian firms.



The Viking Trail: stories of the Great Northern Peninsula

Adrian Payne Flanker Press, 2023

Adrian Payne spent more than fifty years guiding and hunting on the Great Northern Peninsula. The Vikings, who came to the shores of Newfoundland in the 11th century, hunted caribou and trapped furbearing animals in this rugged, untamed wilderness. Generations later, outfitters like Adrian Payne believe they are walking in the footsteps of these legendary Norsemen, and here he pays homage to them with stories of adventure and daring rescue in the wild. When the Vikings overwintered in the New World, specifically in Newfoundland, they had truly found paradise. The ocean was full of cod and other species, and the rivers teemed with salmon and trout. The forest was full of fur-bearing animals. There were shiploads of timber to take back to their homeland, and the mountains were plentiful with thousands of caribou. Why the Vikings didn't stay in Vinland, as they called the island of Newfoundland, is anyone's guess. The decision to leave may have been influenced by the natives, who continually attacked them while they slept. It is believed by many that some of them stayed behind and married into the Innu and Inuit cultures in Labrador.

This collection of life stories brings together vibrant stories of confidence and humanity that were collected from seniors in Quebec and abroad. 

In **My Indian**, Sylvester was hired by William Cormack in 1822 to guide him across Newfoundland in search of Beothuk encampments. In fact, he followed the advice of his Elders and guided Cormack away from the Beothuk. In this sequel, having parted ways with Cormack at St. George's Bay, Sylvester decides to go out on his own, in search of the winter camp of the last of the remaining Beothuk.

Written as fiction by two Mi'kmaw authors, **Suliewey** supports Mi'kmaw oral history of friendly relationships with the Beothuk. The novel reclaims the settler narrative that the Beothuk and the Mi'kmaq of Newfoundland were enemies and represents an existing kinship between the Mi'kmaq and the Beothuk. Rich in oral history, the descriptions of traditional ceremonies and sacred medicines, the use of Mi'kmaw language, and the teachings of two-spirit place readers on the land and embed them in the strong relationships described throughout the book.
